THE MARGARET PROCTOR ENDOWED SCHOLARSHIP SCHOOL OF COMMUNICATIONS

Background:

Dr. Proctor began teaching at GVSU in 1974. She had a passion for teaching creative writing and for getting students to find and use their own individual voices. After a lengthy illness, Dr. Proctor died of leukemia in 2000.

The Margaret Proctor Scholarship rewards writing that is direct, honest and truth-seeking. Its emphasis on fiction writing, including play & film scripts, does not exclude non-fiction. It is awarded annually, covers two semesters, and is not renewable. If two candidates are equally outstanding, the Scholarship will be divided between them. The exact amount of total monies available will not be less than \$500 or no more than \$1,000.

Qualifications:

- 1. Enrolled as a declared degree-seeking School of Communications student. Students who are not full time will, if they receive the award, be pro-rated accordingly.
- 2. Candidates must be making satisfactory academic progress as defined by GVSU.
- 3. Primary requirement is evidence of creative writing aptitude. In making its determination, the School of Communications will give preference to vivid, direct and evocative writing that reflects a unique voice.
